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Pupil Premium funding is allocated to schools based on the number of pupils on roll known to be:

- Currently eligible for Free School meals
- Eligible for Free School meals within the past six years
- Looked after by the local authority
- Adopted from care
- The children of service personnel

Barriers to learning

At Parklands Junior School Pupils who receive Pupil Premium (PP) can face a wide range of difficulties. These barriers to learning are not typical of every pupil who receives the payment and are also not limited to these pupils who receive PP

A Pupil who receives PP may experience:

- · Less financial support within the home
- Less access to basic needs.
- Less support for school work/emotional support
- EAL (English as Additional Language)

These barriers could affect the progress of a pupil who attends Parklands Junior School in significant ways, including:

- Low aspirations
- Low engagement in school life
- Low prior attainment
- Slower progress
- Behavioral difficulties
- Low attendance & punctuality
- Low reading /writing/numeracy ages
- Increased difficulty accessing the curriculum
- · Emotional difficulties leading to low self-esteem and lack of resilience
- · Family disruption within the home.

School Context

Our vision is to ensure that teaching and learning meets the needs of all pupils and that appropriate provision is made for pupils in vulnerable groups. This also includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils (FSM) are identified and strategies put in place to narrow the gap in their attainment.

In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered, or qualify, for free school meals. As a result we reserve the right to allocate Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or group of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged. Any group will be made up of FSM and non-FSM pupils with similar needs.

Range of Provision

Pupils working in small groups focussed on overcoming gaps in learning and meet individual targets. Additional teaching and learning opportunities provided by trained TAs and qualified teachers. Assistance from outside agencies with assessments. Pastoral or emotional support through nurturing activities. Financial assistance to allow full participation in school activities.

Measuring Success

By using the funds as described we aim to raise and improve pupils' progress and achievement, attitude towards learning, wellbeing and self-esteem. Progress will be monitored by tracking results at the end of Autumn and Spring terms and in June.

Learning Mentor / Pastoral Manager	£38,181	Our LM / Pastoral Manager role is funded by PP funding and provides extended support to pupils and their families. She holds a daily drop-in and represents the school at meetings with other agencies. She also undertakes direct work with pupils needing additional support with emotional and behavioural difficulties as well as managing Quad Squad provision.
